

What to do when NOT detecting??

I get asked a lot by friends not in the hobby, what do you do when you can't detect? Well, I realize the perception is that Michigan with it's nearly 8 months of winter sometimes can have a short diggable season. While that is true for some, that isn't the case for many me included. I've had several winters where I detected somewhere here for the full year. But I'm not going to go into that in this article.

Instead, I'm going to focus on other activities I do when not detecting regardless of good or bad weather, essentially, what do I do on those days where I just don't make it into the field or the yard or wherever to swing my coil...but still enjoying some aspect of the treasure hunting hobby! This will be a multi-part series of articles so let's get started. Cleaning, Organizing, and documenting Finds

Yes, it sounds mundane, but I enjoy this almost as much as the detecting sometimes. There are several methods for cleaning and levels of cleaning, and each is suited to a particular find.

Electrolysis – If you've never tried this for some of your relics, iron especially, it is well worth the endeavor. Electrolysis not only cleans the current corrosion that is on a found item, it stabilizes the metal so that it will not rust into dust so to speak. This usually involves a homemade electrolysis tank for larger items like iron axe heads or something you can buy prebuilt like an "Uglybox" for smaller items like coins, jewelry etc. Here is a good resource to get started: <u>https://www.metaldetectingworld.com/electrolysis_rust_removal.shtml</u>

Apple Cider Vinegar – want something to clean off old copper/brass that maybe doesn't have a heavy green patina but is gold plated...try this household item. Soak for 5-10 minutes at a time and then brush lightly with a soft towel, q-tip or other non-abrasive item. If you are worried about how long to soak you can always mix this with water 50/50 to cut down on the acidic percentage which is usually 5% with ACV you can buy for cooking.

Organizing - When I say organizing this can mean different things as well. I like to organize by types, coins, relics (locks, skeleton keys, etc. or military relics) but I also like to organize by a site at least in the short term especially sites I know I'm going back to over and over. Why? Well as often is the case I may find pieces of an item and if I've organized well as I find additional pieces, I can glue them back together for display or whatever, sometimes you don't know what you even have found until it is pieced together so it is nice to have a system for this, a box everything goes into from one site or whatever makes sense for you. Coins can be organized in flip folders, cases, plastic coin capsules, etc. The goal is to be able to enjoy them for a long time so whatever is used make sure it protects the coin, stay away from PVC flips even on dug coins.

Journaling – I know, it sounds like homework, and it can be as tedious so it isn't for everyone but there is a lot of value in writing down everything you find and where at least the keepers. Most people I know that do well over the years do this to some extent. It can really help if for no other reason than to save time later organizing finds by site if that is your thing or researching the history of a site and putting a name with a find if possible. If you think you are going to remember where you found every single coin or relic...think again. So spend a few dollars and pick up a notepad or even buy one that is geared to the hobby. You can do the same thing on a computer too if that is your thing but you'll have to remember what was found where long enough to log in the items later in front of your computer.
